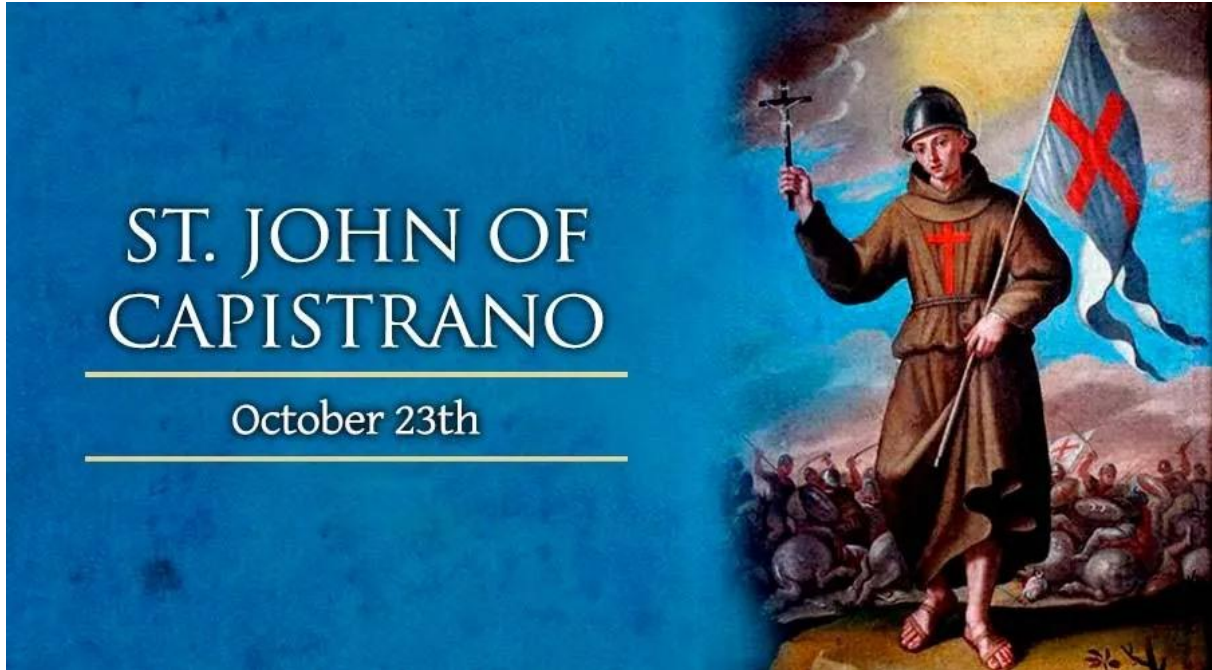


Saint Father John of Capistrano, OFM (1386 - 1456 AD)  
hero of Battle of Belgrade in 1456 against invading Muslim Turks

"Proficient in civil and ecclesiastical law, at the age of twenty-nine, John was named Governor of Perugia, Italy. While attempting to broker peace in a regional war, he was captured and imprisoned.

Saint Francis [of Assisi] came to him in a dream, and upon his release, he embraced radical poverty as a Franciscan. He studied the preaching art under Saint Bernadine of Siena. After one sermon, one hundred of his listeners applied to the Franciscans.

In his role of papal diplomat, John worked for the unity of East and West at the Council of Florence. He died in 1456 after [valiantly and with total success] leading soldiers in a battle defending Belgrade against the [invading Muslim] Turks."\*

It was through his devotion to The Holy Name of JESUS that the Catholics were able to defeat the invading Muslims Turks in that crucial Battle of Belgrade, with Saint John of Capistrano and every Christian soldier calling out, "JESUS! JESUS!"
